COVID-19 AWARENESS MAY 6, 2020



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Region and MIDPAC Ohana,

During some of the many briefings I receive on our operations during COVID-19, I have heard the term "silver linings" used. We cannot downplay the negative impacts we have experienced due to this unseen opponent, but at the same time, many positives have emerged. These will improve the way we conduct all our operations as we move forward. COVID-19 has forced us to take a hard look at the way we resource our operations due to social distancing and other restrictions. As an example, we have already implemented teleworking processes that could become necessary during a severe weather scenario like the one we are simulating and preparing for during HURREX 2020.

There continues to be positive signs that your hard work in implementing policies and processes are making a real difference in minimizing the spread of COVID-19 in Hawaii. Soon we will be able to resume some of the on-base services we had to suspend. This will be done gradually and in a manner consistent with state and local authorities. While we may want to flip the switch from "off" to "on" and resume all normal operations at the same time, we will be using a dimmer switch, gradually increasing these services only when we are confident it is safe to do so.

Admiral Gilday emphasizes our Navy's unique role as the forward deployed force of our country. This is why we continue to focus on the health of our Force – our people and their families – while remaining prepared for operations at sea.

You have heard me say more than once that now is not the time to be complacent and it still applies. As we see some indications of things returning to normal, there could be a tendency to let our guard down. Helping us to keep our guard up should be acknowledging the fact that a second wave of infections is possible, if not likely and will greatly depend how we respond moving forward. While we are currently looking to reduce our measures, we must also be ready to move back in the direction of more restrictive operations. You have shown remarkable resilience and flexibility, and I ask you to continue to take actions to protect yourself and those around you by continuing to use protective measures. Protecting our people has remained a priority from the start. We must take continue to take prudent measure to limit COVID-19's spread, while also ensuring our people are trained and ready to defend the nation.

The light at the end of the tunnel seems to be getting brighter, but we must keep focused. Many great resources can help you to stay up to date on the latest information related to COVID-19.
