COVID-19 Awareness - Dec. 9, 2020

Region and MIDPAC Ohana,

This week we observed the 79<sup>th</sup> anniversary of one of the pivotal moments in the history of our Navy and our nation: the attacks on Oahu on December 7th. Those attacks did not have the intended effect of sidelining the United States as an effective military power in the Pacific. Rather, in the words attributed to the Imperial Navy commander, they awakened "a sleeping giant and filled him with a terrible resolve."

We are fortunate to live in a place that is so rich in history. There are not many places where you feel so close to events that shaped the course of our nation. For anyone who has spent more than a year in Hawaii, the December 7<sup>th</sup> commemoration is an occasion for reverent reflection and remembrance at ceremonies held at the scenes of these battles across our island. Because of COVID-19, only one ceremony was held this week – the principal ceremony at the Pearl Harbor National Memorial. And only the official party was able to participate in-person in the ceremony. For the first time in memory, no Pearl Harbor survivor or World War II veteran were able to attend the ceremony.

COVID-19 did not weaken our resolve to honor the sacrifices of these heroes. The ceremony was conducted in a virtual fashion and was streamed live via several channels, reaching thousands of people around the globe. The result was a commemoration that, while small, had a more intimate feel, as observers were closer to the event than in previous years.
