COVID-19 Awareness - April 9, 2020

Region and MIDPAC Ohana,

I ask you all to read the CNO Message to the Fleet, released yesterday (https://www.navy.mil/submit/display.asp?story_id=112577). He states that the Navy is moving forward and executing our orders, and our people are on mission overseas and on the homefront as we speak. The CNO gives us his three priorities:

- 1. Our health and safety
- 2. Ongoing fleet operations and our support to the coronavirus effort
- 3. Continuing to generate the enormous amount of support to keep #1 and #2 on track

Know that each of you is a vital member of our Navy team making these things happen. This e-mail takes a slightly different approach in updating you on the status of our battle against COVID-19, focusing on two themes: **Complacency** and **Creativity**. Since my last update, we have seen reports from state public health officials that Hawaii's positive COVID-19 rate has remained steady at roughly 2.7% since late last week. This past Monday there were actually fewer new cases reported than reported the previous Saturday and Sunday. While we could view this as an indication that the tide might be turning, those same health officials are not ready to come to that conclusion – and neither should we. We welcome any glimmer of hope that we are gaining momentum, but we cannot afford to let ourselves become **complacent** at this critical juncture. We must keep the pressure on, as we still have a long way to go before we can declare victory against our unseen enemy.

We have also seen a lot more over the past few days about the value of face-coverings. There is a growing evidence that people who are infected with COVID-19 can spread the virus even before they develop symptoms. Wearing a cloth face-covering may help prevent the spread of the virus by people who are infected and may not know it. In support of this finding, both DOD and Navy leadership have directed, to the extent practical, the use of cloth face-coverings for all military, Navy civilians and contractors and family members while on DoD property, installations and facilities at times when it is not possible to maintain six feet of social distance in public areas or work centers.

These requirements extend beyond the workplace. Patrons shopping at all base retail establishments, such as commissaries and exchanges, will be required to wear a protective mask, beginning today. The face-covering can be homemade and/or improvised, but must be of layered cloth material that covers the nose and mouth. This applies to all patrons, military and civilian.
