Auntie Kehaulani Lum and Uncle Bruce Keaulani shared the history of Loko I'a Pā'āiau, the ancient fishpond near McGrew Point Navy housing, last week with staffers representing congressional delegates from the U.S. House Appropriations Subcommittee on Defense. The delegation participated in cultural protocol and learned about the MOU signed by the Navy and leaders from Living Life Source Foundation, Ali'i Pauahi Hawaiian Civic Club, Nā Lima No'eau and affiliated native Hawaiian organizations to preserve, restore, and maintain Loko I'a Pā'āiau.



PMRF Joins Community for Fishpond Work Day

Members of Pacific Missile Range Facility on Kauai joined Mālama Hulē'ia at the 600-year-old Alakoko Fishpond for last month's community work day. The fishpond has been described as "one of the finest examples in the entire archipelago of prehistoric stonework and fishpond construction." Mālama Hulē'ia leads community efforts to remove invasive mangrove along Hulē'ia River, re-establish native wetland ecosystems, manage Alakoko Fishpond, and engage the community through environmental stewardship programs that honor Hawaiian culture and values.



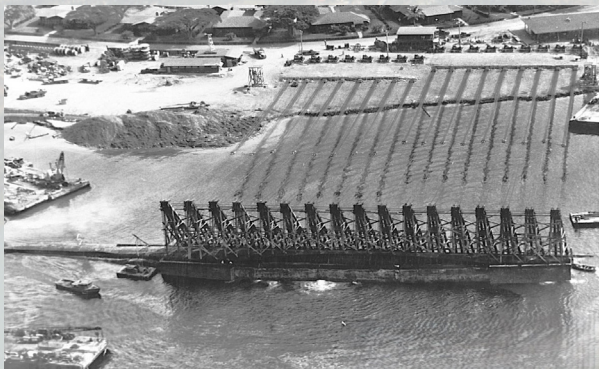
U.S. Pacific Fleet Commander Visits USS Montana

Admiral Steve Koehler, commander of U.S. Pacific Fleet, toured the Virginia-class fast-attack submarine USS Montana (SSN 794) on Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam (JBPHH) last week. JBPHH became the USS Montana's new homeport in December 2024. Assigned to Submarine Squadron 1, the USS Montana is capable of supporting various missions, including anti-submarine warfare, anti-surface ship warfare, strike warfare, and intelligence, surveillance, and reconnaissance.

This Week in History: February 9, 1944

On Feb. 9, 1944, rolling operations commenced in an attempt to right the USS Utah, which had been capsized as a result of the Dec. 7 attack on Pearl Harbor. By the afternoon of Dec. 11, the ship had rolled to 68 degrees port, but her hull was sinking into the mud. On March 15, 1944, all salvage operations on the ship were aborted and the USS Utah remained at its former berth, F-11, with a 37-degree list to port.
